LOOKING FOR some nostalgic, festive and time-honored décor inspiration for your next special occasion? A time capsule of antique displays, a new book, A Very Vintage Holiday, transports readers back to an era of magical and crafted seasonal décor and accoutrements. Author Bob Richter draws from his decades of antiquing and flea market thrifting experience coupled with his family history of jobs in upholstery, window treatments and other interior design disciplines.

"Contrary to popular belief, I'm not always jolly or even always in a holiday mood, but once I start decorating, there's a spring in my step—and the rest falls into place," Richter writes. "And when things fall into place, we share memories and we make memories."



## **NOSTALGIC CHARM.**

Graphics from classic Christmas tales and records are instantly successful to evoke nostalgia and cheerful additions to your holiday décor. Decades-old catalogs, ceramic or light-up figurines, timeworn embroidery and old bottlebrush trees can also be used to sprinkle in vintage charm.



The chapters cover everything from generic vintage-holiday tips for interacting in the world of antiquing to an in-depth layout of major U.S. celebrations. For each event, Richter explains how he works in traditions (both new and old), which decorations he uses, the treats and meals he bakes, ideas for holiday activities and how he stays present in the festive atmosphere.



A TREE FOR EVERY ROOM. Richter lovingly constructs about 20 different Christmas trees every winter, each one taking on a slightly different look to match the room's overall vintage theme. Though most of the trees are taken down in the new year, some remain to take on decorations for various other

Richter's nostalgic holiday playbook not only outlines individual items he has collected over the years and their unique backstories, but also provides meal ideas, DIY project inspiration and gratitude for those who have curated these looks before him. Readers will learn tidbits of holiday history—like how the first valentine on record is from the 15th century—and receive what feels like a personal tour of Richter's thoughtfully decorated home.

The author also includes birthday-hosting tips for readers with friends or family members who are vintage enthusiasts. Throughout the chapters, he focuses on appreciating the past as a category for décor just as much as creating new traditions and family heirlooms that will be considered vintage in 40 years or so! Speaking from how his own family's celebrations instilled comfort, connection and continuity in his life, Richter sets out to bring those same sentiments to readers of A Very Vintage Holiday.

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OH, MY GOURD! Gourds are go-to décor throughout the fall, including through Thanksgiving. For each occasion, Richter mixes old with the new, like this fall hodgepodge of ceramic candy containers, spices used in autumnal baking, antique postcards and copious gourds.



## Hit the Antique Markets Like a Pro

FACING FLEA MARKET FRUSTRATION? BOB RICHTER'S **BOOK COULD BE THE INSPIRATION YOU NEED. HERE ARE** SOME OF HIS TIPS TO HEED THIS YEAR.

- **Shop smart.** Instead of shopping for Christmas decorations in November or Easter decorations in March, scour the stores in the off-seasons. Prices are lower and not as many people are competing for the same items. Richter advises to snag Halloween décor in April and to not pass up those post-holiday sales in January.
- Mix old and new. Some antique electronics may not hold up season after season, but new technology can help increase longevity. For example, swapping out the original lights for LEDs on a light-up display can prolong its life while reducing any financial burden that comes with repairing old bulbs—or replacing entire items each year.
- Take a road trip. Supporting your local antiques shops is important, but don't be afraid to venture outside your normal circles. Richter shares his top 10 flea markets to check out across the United States based on his decades of experience antiquing throughout the country.
